What are parenthetical citations?

- ** Parenthetical* is from the word *parentheses*.
 These guys

 () are parentheses.
- * Parenthetical citation is done <u>within</u> an essay <u>after</u> the writer uses a quote or a piece of textual evidence.
- * We use parenthetical citations to give credit to the writers whose work we borrow and use to strengthen our essays.

*This is due to dogs' "superior senses of hearing and scent" which alert them to "intruders and other possible threats" (Bishop).

*Bishop is the <u>author</u> of the <u>online article</u> being quoted.

* As Sandra Kelley states in the article "Dog Psychology," "Dogs are wired to submit to their masters. They hope to win affection and treats for their good behavior."

*Sandra Kelley is the author of the <u>online</u> article.

*()?? Where is the parenthetical citation at the end of the example?

* The situation intensifies when the police officer says, "It's a vendetta, leader (Moore, 79).

* Moore is the author of the printed book being quoted.

*The quote is on page 79.

* Only hinting at the setting, Neil Gaiman writes, "the events that follow transpired many years ago" (5).

* Neil Gaiman is the author of the printed book being quoted

*The quote is on page 5.

The Rules?

* If the <u>author is mentioned</u> in the sentence, <u>do NOT</u> write the last name in () at the end of the sentence.
* If the <u>author is NOT mentioned</u> in the sentence, <u>write</u> the last name in the () at the end of the sentence.

The Rules?

*For a print source (a physical book, newspaper, academic journal, etc.), put the page <u>number(s)</u> in the () at the end of the sentence.
